Fund Objective and Investment Process

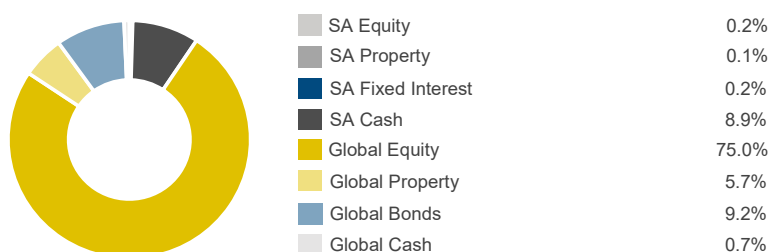
The objective of the portfolio is to achieve inflation-beating returns in US dollars over rolling periods of 5 years or more. The portfolio manager will continually assess the prospects for global asset classes and reflect this in the portfolio. The portfolio manager will research global asset managers across all sectors and combine portfolios to achieve the above objective. The portfolio will not comply with Regulation 28 of the Pension Funds Act. The portfolio is moderately aggressive and suits long-term investors looking for global growth and diversification into non-South African assets with high growth potential.

Global Assets

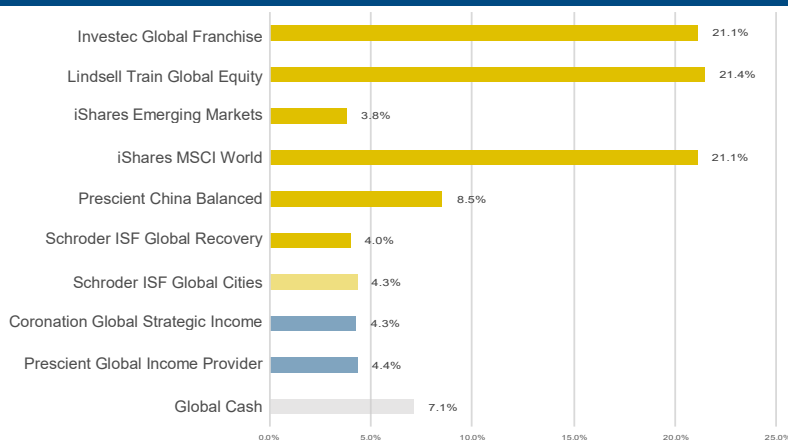

Fund Manager Commentary

July continued the recovery experienced globally since the COVID-19-induced crash in March. Although, South Africa lagged the recovery in both DM and EM, it was still positive across most asset classes as the prospect of a relaxation of lockdown loomed. A further rate cut during the month sent the repo rate down to 3.5% and should provide something of a boost to the SA consumer who has been battered for some years now, and then hammered by the pandemic. There is another 25bps cut forecast by the market and that will then be the bottom of the cycle. However, the next hiking cycle is not on the horizon yet. Correspondingly, the inflation rate in SA has plummeted to the 2% level but it, too, has bottomed and electricity and petrol prices will start to push that up well into the SARB band of 3%-6%. However, it is still under control and benign. Bond yields remain attractive in both nominal and real terms – although we will be keeping an eye on this market. Foreigners have sold substantial quantities of SA debt due to concerns about the control government has over the public finances. Any further worries on that score will increase rates and damage the exchange rate. Global equity remains the asset class of choice even with some eye-watering valuations on some of the large US-based tech stocks. We hold very little of those high-flying stocks preferring the sound balance sheets and earnings potential of some of the less obvious choices which are clocking up impressive incremental returns. Global fixed interest is still anchored to the zero mark and shows no signs of climbing into real positive territory for some time. We prefer global equities for capital appreciation and SA fixed interest for yield.

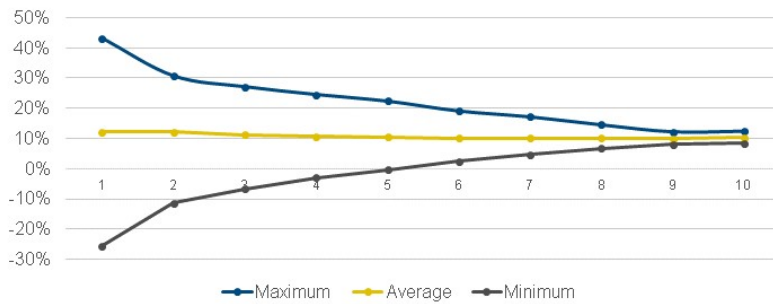
